Israeli Voice Index, March 2020:

76% of Israelis are Concerned They'll Contract the Coronavirus | 73.5% Worry About Personal Finances | Only 40% are Satisfied with Minister of Health Litzman's Performance

The Israeli Voice Index for March 2020, found that 76% of Israelis are concerned that they or a family member will contract the coronavirus – up from 34% in February.

The Israeli Voice Index is a monthly survey conducted by the Guttman Center for Public Opinion and Policy Research at the Israel Democracy Institute.

Finding Highlights

Worried about the Economic Future – most Israelis (73.5%) are worried about their economic future. (Jewish Israelis – 71%, Arab Israelis – 79%). 90.5% of those who are concerned about contracting coronavirus are also worried about their economic future. Of those not worried about contracting the coronavirus, only 31% are worried about their economic future.

Worried about contracting Coronavirus - 76% of Israelis are concerned that they or a family member will contract the coronavirus – up from 34% in February.


Grades for the Current Functioning of Leadership and Institutions – Moshe Bar Siman-Tov, Director General of the Ministry of Health, received high grades in comparison with other public officials for his handling of the crisis: 68% of Israelis think he is doing a good job. By contrast, only 40% think the same of the Minister of Health, MK Yaakov Litzman.

60% of Israelis think that Prime Minister Netanyahu is doing a good job – while only 34% think the same of MK Benjamin Gantz, and 18% of MK Yair Lapid. Additionally, against the backdrop of the Speaker of the Knesset's decision last week not to allow the Knesset plenum to adjourn – MK Yuli Edelstein received low grades (31%) as well.

83% of Israelis think that the hospitals are doing a good job; 58.5% think the same of the media; and only 39% think that the Ministry of Finance is performing well.

Shin Bet and Coronavirus – 59% of Israelis trust Israel Security Agency (ISA - Shin Bet) and the government, to use the information collected from cellular phones to prevent the spread of the coronavirus (Arab Israelis – 38%, Jewish Israelis – 63%). Segmentation by political camp found that 68% of self-identified rightwing voters, 60% of the 'Center' and 45.5% of leftwing voters express such trust.

Trust the Shin Bet (ISA- Israel Security Agency) and government officials accessing citizens' cell-phone information to use the data solely for the prevention of infections in the current crisis (% , Jews and Arabs)



Restrictions – the majority of Israelis (53.5%) think that the restrictions the government put in place to fight the spread of the coronavirus are appropriate for the situation. 36.5% think that the restrictions are too lenient and should be expanded. 50% of Arab Israelis and 34% of Jewish Israelis think that the restrictions are too lenient.

Unity Government – Before Gantz’s declaration that he is willing to join a unity government, 57% of Israelis supported the establishment of a unity government with the Likud and Blue and White parties, including a 'rotation' for among Netanyahu and Gantz as prime minister. 36% said at the time that they would like Netanyahu to serve first as prime minister, and 21% preferred Gantz. Only 13.5% were in favor of a minority government of rightwing parties, headed by Netanyahu; and 13 % favored a minority government of leftwing parties headed by Gantz.

The Israeli Voice Index is a project of the Guttman Center for Public Opinion and Policy Research of the Israel Democracy Institute. In the survey, conducted on the internet and by telephone (to supplement the representation of groups who use the internet less frequently) The

Jewish Israeli sample, which included 611 respondents between March 24-26, 2020, and the Arab-Israeli sample, which included 149 respondents, constituting a representative national sample of Israel's adult population aged 18 and older.
