A bold **new paradigm for integration** of the ultra-Orthodox and Arab communities.



A blueprint for sweeping civil service reform to promote efficiency and restore **public trust in government.** 



A proposal for a new status quo on matters of **religion** and state.



A plan to decentralize government power and **bolster local authorities.** 



A set of policies to address post-October 7<sup>th</sup> **internal security challenges.** 



A plan for **regulation of the cyber domain** and social
media to protect Israeli
democracy from foreign and
domestic efforts to undermine it.



A new proposal for the **IDF's model of service** to meet postwar manpower needs and achieve more equal sharing of the burden of national defense.
